In November 1580, Papal troops who were mainly from Italy and Spain, but some of whom were Irish, were in Dún an Óir to help the Irish Catholic Earl of Desmond. English troops arrived and besieged the soldiers. The earl was in rebellion against the Protestant Queen of England, Elizabeth I. The Papal army surrendered and most were put to death, many by beheading. It is a sad incident in the history of the area.


- ③ Draw it here



- ④ The word ‘Dún’ usually means some kind of fortification. This site is a ‘promontory fort’, that is, a piece of land jutting into the sea which has been fortified with banks or walls. Walk along the fortifications.

- ⑤ Choose and then draw the helmet that the Spanish soldier (right) at Dún an Óir would have worn.

- ⑥ Do you think it would be easier to attack the fort by land or by sea?
Why?

- ⑦ There are two fields near here called “Gort a’ Ghearradh” (the field of the cutting) and “Gort na gCeann” (the field of the heads). Can you think why?

- ⑧ Dún an Óir juts out into a harbour. Do you know the name of the harbour (in Irish/English)?

- ⑨ Across the harbour, if it is a fine day, you can see Mount Brandon, the 2nd highest mountain in Ireland. Do you know the name of the highest mountain? (Hint, it is also in Kerry).

- ⑩ There are other promontory forts on the Dingle Peninsula, many whose names begin with ‘Dún’. Can you think of any?

- ⑤ Corca Dhuibhe has a long connection with Spain, and Dingle town was a place from where pilgrims set out to visit Santiago de Compostela. What can you find out about that city, and the famous person buried in the cathedral there?

- ⑥ An agreement known as ‘The Treaty of Dingle’ was made in 1529, giving many Irish people a special status if they wanted to go to live in Spain and other areas ruled by the Spanish Crown. What can you find out about this?

- ⑦ A siege took place at Dún an Óir, but there is also a dance called after a siege. The place is in County Clare. Do you know the name of this dance? Try and find the music to it and maybe learn the dance (you will need quite a few people to do this!)

- ⑧ Famous sieges took place in other parts of Ireland, can you think of any (think of a county town in Northern Ireland, and another city near the mouth of the River Shannon)?
